MESSAGES BY THE STUDENTS

Clearing PLAB 1: A Roadmap from Someone Who's Been There, Done That.

In an increasingly competitive world of international medical licensing, choosing the right path can be overwhelming. To help

students navigate their options, we spoke with Dr. Shubham Chugh, a recent graduate who has completed his MBBS and internship and successfully cleared PLAB 1.

Now preparing for PLAB 2, he shared honest insights, practical strategies, and advice every student considering PLAB should hear.



Why PLAB?

When asked why he chose PLAB over other pathways like USMLE or AMC, Dr. Shubham explained, "PLAB felt more approachable. The journey is shorter, more streamlined, and doesn't require the kind of extensive, multi-step grind that something like the USMLE demands."

While he didn't explore the AMC pathway deeply, he found PLAB to be a more navigable option, especially for Indian graduates who are confident in their clinical foundations.

When Should You Start Preparing?

Dr. Shubham emphasized that a strong foundation is key. "If your basics from the early years are solid, PLAB 1 becomes fairly easy to tackle."

He suggested that a good time to start PLAB-focused preparation is at the beginning of fourth year. Since the exam heavily focuses on clinical subjects, he advised tackling them one at a time from an exam-oriented perspective. During the earlier years, he strongly recommended making most of the postings. "Observe what's happening. Understanding real-time cases is more valuable than trying to perfect physical skills early on - those can be picked up later."

For study resources & approach for his final preparation, Dr. Shubham relied heavily on the PLABable app, calling it his main resource. He especially found the "gems" section helpful for high-yield revision. "If you've been consistent through MBBS, then 6-8 weeks of dedicated, exam-specific study is enough to clear PLAB 1."









When to Give the Exam?

Since PLAB 1 can only be attempted during or after internship, Dr. Shubham recommended starting focused preparation in final year and scheduling the exam during internship. "It gives you a psychological edge. When you complete your internship, you're already halfway through the process - only PLAB 2 remains."

On Managing Consistent Studying-

Well-known for being a regular in the library, Dr. Shubham said his consistency came down to balance. "It's not about slogging endlessly. Efficiency matters more than how many hours you sit. Take breaks. Be smart about your time."

What You Should Know About PLAB Today?

PLAB 1 is a one-day, 180-question MCQ based exam designed to test whether a candidate has the knowledge and clinical judgment of a UK Foundation Year 2 doctor. PLAB 2 is an OSCE conducted in the UK, comprising 16 clinical and communication-based stations.

Key Points for 2025 Aspirants:

- PLAB 1 is now offered in multiple Indian cities, increasing accessibility.
- IELTS or OET is mandatory before registering for PLAB 1 plan this early.

Looking Ahead:

PLAB 2 and Beyond PLAB 2 is a practical exam that tests clinical application and communication across 16 stations. "It's more than just theory. It's about how you deal with patients in real-life settings—empathetically, confidently, and clearly."

For OSCE prep, Dr. Shubham recommended the YouTube channel 'Geeky Medics', which helped him visualize clinical exams and improve practical understanding. "Their videos really helped me see how clinical interactions work—not just from a checklist perspective but in real human terms." Dr. Shubham is currently preparing for PLAB 2 from his hometown and remains optimistic about the journey ahead.

Final Words

"PLAB isn't a shortcut—it's a clear and achievable path for those who've done the work. Keep your concepts strong, stay consistent, and use the right resources. You don't need to overcomplicate it."

We wish Dr. Shubham the very best as he prepares for PLAB 2 and embarks on his journey to practice in the UK. His clarity, discipline, and humility serve as an inspiration to juniors navigating their own career paths.












12. "Social reasons."


"Next month is my brother's wedding!" "We have a world tour next week!" endless reasons!
